National News & Legislative Updates:

- Stay in the Loop: <u>Afterschool Alliance Update Email</u>
- Administrative updates:
 - New Executive Order Would Dismantle U.S. Department of Education: The Trump Administration has issued an Executive Order directing the closure of the U.S. Department of Education, raising concerns about the future of federal afterschool funding. While eliminating the Department would

require Congressional action, any restructuring could impact the 21st Century Community Learning Centers (21st CCLC) program, which serves 1.4 million students nationwide. <u>Read</u> on to learn more about the potential changes and what they mean for afterschool and summer learning programs.

- ED Firings Impact OST Programs: On March 11, the U.S. Department of Education fired 1,300 staff, with the biggest cuts to Federal Student Aid and the Office for Civil Rights. Nearly all staff at the Institute of Education Sciences were dismissed. While Title-funded programs remain unaffected, several 21st CCLC program officers have resigned or retired, raising concerns about future impacts. A lawsuit was filed Friday by parents and disability rights groups, and a federal judge has ordered reinstatement for recently fired probationary employees.
- New Executive Order Targets IMLS; Late Friday, President Trump signed an executive order to eliminate the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS), reducing its functions to the legal minimum. While IMLS is congressionally authorized and received \$294.8 million in FY 2024, the lack of programspecific allocations in the FY 2025 continuing resolution may ease funding cuts. More details are available from our partners at the <u>Association for Science and Technology Centers</u> (ASTC) and the <u>American Library Association</u>, which highlights IMLSfunded programs like STEM education, internet access, and veterans' telehealth services.
- Joint Address to Congress: On Tuesday, March 4th President Trump delivered his Joint Address to Congress. While there were no direct mentions of education policy, several related social issues were addressed, including the President's opposition to diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) policies, critical race theory in schools, and transgender participation in women's sports.
- Congressional Budget updates: President Trump signed the Full-Year Continuing Appropriations and Extensions Act, ensuring government funding through September, but not without significant budget shifts. Unlike a "clean" continuing resolution that merely extends funding deadlines, this bill includes targeted spending changes. Non-defense programs saw a \$13 billion reduction, while defense spending increased by \$6 billion, resulting in a net \$7 billion cut—just 0.1% of total federal spending.
